





Grant Writing Assistance Program

As of October 1st, 2024 a third round of the Long Island Sound Resilience Grant Writing Support Program is available.

The Program assists NY and CT communities within the LIS Coastal Boundary to hire a grant writing consultant to develop successful sustainability and resilience-focused project grant proposals and increase capacity within municipalities and community organizations to navigate the funding landscape. Up to \$9,950 in funding is available per application and match is not required! The Program is open on a rolling basis until all the available funding has been allocated.

Planning Support Program

As of **December 6th, 2024** a second round of the Long Island Sound Resilience Planning Support Program is available!

Deadline to apply is February 7th, 2025. Up to \$1 million will be available.

The Program provides planning support to advance climate resilience-focused projects by matching communities within the LIS Coastal Boundary across NY and CT with qualified contractors to assist with assessing local climate risks, conceptualizing project ideas, and conducting preliminary planning efforts. The support is provided at no cost to the communities and no match is required!





Long Island Sound Resilience Planning Support Program



Goal: To advance sustainable and resilience focused projects to a design or implementation grant-ready stage

Type of Technical Assistance: Project Scoping and Planning

Application Period:

Round 1 – October 16th, 2023 - December 15th, 2023

Round 2 – December 6th, 2024 - February 7th, 2025

Award Amount: 1st round awards were between \$35K-\$115K *No funds are given to the applicants, funds are reimbursed directly to contractor.

Match: None required



Long Island Sound Resilience Grant Writing Assistance Program



Goal: To secure funding for sustainable and resilience-focused projects

Type of Technical Assistance: Grant Preparation and Writing Support (Budget preparation, Cost-benefit analysis, Writing and narrative development. Mapping, Application preparation and submission)

<u>Application Period</u>: Rolling basis until all available funding is allocated

Award Amount: Up to \$9,950 per application directly to contractor. Each Application should focus on one discrete project. Applicants can now submit multiple Applications.

Match: None required

- Program Priorities
 - Implementation,

- Timeline: March 27-May 29
- How much \$ is available?
 - Dependent on EPA funding, anticipated will be about \$11.5M

Are there match requirements?

- 1:0.5 match ratio
- \$100,000 grant would require \$50,000 in matching contributions

Who is eligible?

 Non-profit 501(c) organizations, state government agencies, local government, municipal government, Tribal Governments/Organizations and educational institutions

Tips for Success

- What are some tips for success or common mistakes to avoid?
 - O Looking for a detailed proposal aligns closely with the program priorities and includes a project team that supports the level of effort required to achieve the outcomes proposed and is cost-effective.
- Common mistakes/pitfalls:
 - Answer each of the narrative questions, be detailed in the budget and metrics narrative and notes sections
- Any other considerations:
 - o Include what makes the project unique and timely!

 - O LISCIF provides funds for project priorities listed below, located in Connecticut and New York.
- What are the priorities for your next funding cycle?
 - Projects that result in quantifiable pollutant prevention of reduction.
 - Restoring habitat within the <u>Important Coastal Habitat Types</u> targeted by LISS.
 - Projects that foster a diverse balance and abundant populations of fish, birds, and wildlife.
 - O Public engagement, knowledge, and stewardship.
 - Projects that enhance community resilience and sustainability.

Tips for Success

- What makes a grant proposal competitive?
 - Attend informational grant webinars and trainings.
 - O Request 1-1 support as needed.
 - O Directly answer questions in the application.
- Common mistakes/pitfalls:
 - Waiting until the last minute to log-on to the application portal.
 - Forgetting deadlines.
- Any other considerations:
 - Meaningfully engage community show collaborations.
 - O Build out stipends and participant support costs.



Solar for All

Federal grant from US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) through the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund to increase access to distributed solar and energy storage technologies for low-income and disadvantaged communities. DEEP has five years to spend the \$62.45 million grant and will focus on multifamily affordable housing in implementing the Solar for All funding through Project SunBridge. DEEP encourages participation in stakeholder and community engagement opportunities as the details of Project SunBridge implementation are determined. Funding is expected to be available to customers in 2025.

Application Deadline: To be determined Grant Closed Date: August 31, 2029 Point of Contact: DEEP.EnergyBureau@ct.gov

Grid Resilience State/Tribal Grant Program

Federal grant from the US DOE which will support the efficient and reliable integration of variable and distributed energy resources needed to meet the state's 100% zero-carbon electric sector goal and avoid fossil peaking generation. DEEP will receive a total of \$16 million over a period of five years. Grant funds will be used to improve system reliability and resilience in various weather and storm conditions as well as to attract, train, and retain a skilled and local workforce, especially from disadvantaged communities. There is not an active request for proposals to select projects. DEEP has not yet selected projects for the funding


 First round of funding supported resilience plans and project planning from the scale of individual projects through COG-wide efforts

CT DEEP CWA § 319 NPS Management Grant



What does your program fund?

 Planning <u>or</u> implementation projects that address nonpoint source (NPS) water pollution.

What are the priorities for your next funding cycle?

Anticipate similar to FY25 priorities:

- Projects implementing a Watershed Based Plan;
- Projects within priority watersheds;
- Natural hazard adaptation through NPS solutions;
- High impact or ready-to-implement projects;
- Agricultural land use projects.

When is the funding available?

O Typically: annual Request for Proposals is Nov-Feb; awards announced in Aug; execute DEEP contracts within Jan-Mar.

How much \$ is available?

• About \$1.2 million annually is available for awards.

Are there match requirements?

o 40% match for each award, may waive in some cases.

Who is eligible?

 Local/state government, quasi-state agencies, schools/universities, nonprofits, community groups.
 Recipients must be registered with CT Secretary of State.

CT DEEP CWA § 319 NPS Management Grant



- The most important tip for success:
 - O Submit a completed application to address NPS pollution, including milestones and measurables outcomes that a project is anticipated to have upon completion.
- Three things applicants should keep in mind:
 - 1. Contract process for the award is comprehensive work cannot begin and funding is not available until a contract with DEEP is executed, careful planning is required with budgeting and partners.
 - 2. The program is prioritizing funds for fewer, larger projects annually.
 - 3. Projects for stormwater permits requirements are not eligible; but addressing stormwater above and beyond the permit requirements may be eligible.
- Other things new applicants should know about this funding opportunity:
 - Awards vary in range, many between \$100,000 \$400,000 but there is no restrictions in the application.
 - CT DEEP has recently made efforts to streamline the grant process; applicants should be ready to submit a
 work plan soon after project award notification.

What does your program fund?

 Urban forestry projects in disadvantaged communities. Project types include tree planting and maintenance, invasive species control, education and outreach, urban wood utilization, and others.

What are the priorities for your next funding cycle?

 Workforce development, impervious surface removal, tree planting as means of extreme heat mitigation

When is the funding available?

- Anticipated RFP release in June 2025
- How much \$ is available?
 - Approximately \$1 Million
- Are there match requirements?
 - NO MATCH
- Who is eligible?
 - State and local government, federally recognized tribes, non-profit organizations, public institutions of higher education

- What does your program fund?
 - Efforts to restore and improve urban forests lost due to catastrophic losses from emerald ash borer and other forest pests.
- What are the priorities for your next funding cycle?
 - Hazard tree removal and replacement
- When is the funding available?
 - Anticipated RFP release in June 2025

- How much \$ is available?
 - o \$143,000
- Are there match requirements?
 - o 50% match required
- Who is eligible?
 - State and local government, federally recognized tribes, non-profit organizations

Urban Forest Equity Urban Forest Resilience



- What are some tips for success or common mistakes to avoid?
 - Demonstrate local buy-in and ongoing community engagement.
 - Be in contact with DEEP's UCF program with questions or for feedback. Attend bi-weekly office hours.
 - Convey clear methodology and deliverables. Keep the scope of work focused and concise.

 - Nonprofits, Municipalities, COGs, Tribal Gov.

CT Recreational Trails





- The most important tip for success:
 - O Clear and complete application, review grant application guidelines and follow the templates.
- Three things applicants should keep in mind:
 - 1. Projects need to address trails as the primary focus!
 - 2. Planning/Design projects can include environmental review information and public outreach within the scope.
 - 3. Projects NEED to have access and approval, even on state lands.

- What does your program fund?
 - Purchase of permanent interests in land
- What are the priorities for your next funding cycle?

4 main areas for scoring:

- 1. Administrative
- 2. Public Access & Outdoor Recreation
- 3. Environmental Justice & Equity
- 4. Climate Change & Natural Resources

- When is the funding available?
 - Next round will open end of May/early June
- How much \$ is available?
 - Based on appraisal price of property
- Are there match requirements?
 - Up to 65% or 75% of fair market value price covered depending on location
- Who is eligible?
 - Municipalities, non-profit conservation organizations & water companies

Open Space & Watershed Land Acquisition Grant



- What are some tips for success or common mistakes to avoid?
 - O Contact us if you have questions Allyson Clarke Allyson.Clarke@ct.gov or 860-424-3774
- Three things applicants should keep in mind:
 - O Need an appraisal and appraisal review for application
 - O Should work on a purchase and sale agreement with current property owner
 - O The process can be complicated and take quite some time

Urban Green & Community Garden Grant



What does your program fund?

- Creation, enhancement or restoration of urban green space: green infrastructure, community gardens, passive recreational trails, etc.
- What are the priorities for your next funding cycle?
 - Green infrastructure rain gardens,
 bioswales, native plantings

- When is the funding available?
 - Next round will open end of May/early June
- How much \$ is available?
 - No upper limit on request, but can only be 20% of yearly grants from OSWA/UGCG pool of funding
- Are there match requirements?
 - 0 50 %
- Who is eligible?
 - Non-profits or Municipalities in Distressed Municipality,
 Environmental Justice Community, or Targeted
 Investment Community

Urban Green & Community Garden Grant



- What are some tips for success or common mistakes to avoid?
 - O Contact us if you have questions Steven Perry– steven.perry@ct.gov or 860-424-3603
 - O Provide a clear budget and project proposal tied to drawing/site plan
 - Volunteer hours/donated materials count as match
 - The project can be used for a portion of a larger park improvement project
 - Cannot be used to pay for park infrastructure playgrounds, ball fields, courts, etc.

- What does your program fund?
 - Public Outdoor Recreation: Land
 Acquisition and/or Park Enhancements-including fields, courts, playgrounds,
 splash pads, etc.
- What are the priorities for your current funding cycle?
 - Park improvements and acquisition in underserved communities

- When is the funding available?
 - o Open now
- How much \$ is available?
 - o \$300,000 to \$15 Million in grant funding
- Are there match requirements?
 - 0 50 %
- Who is eligible?
 - Municipalities in underserved communities

Outdoor Recreation and Legacy Partnership Program Grant



- What are some tips for success or common mistakes to avoid?

 - Provide a clear budget and project proposal tied to drawing/site plan
 - Must be ready to break ground 1-2 years after awarded so much of the planning has to be done
 prior to applying

O Grants further consistent and systematic fair, just and impartial treatment of all individuals, including individuals who belong to underserved and marginalized communities that have been denied such treatment.

• When is the funding available?

- At least twice annually through 2027; Spring and Fall
- How much \$ is available?
 - Up to \$875,000,000; \$175,000,000/year
- Are there match requirements?
 - No match required
- Who is eligible?
 - Community Development Corporations in Public Investment Communities and/or Alliance Districts (currently 55 municipalities)

- The most important tip for success:
 - Intentional, transformational projects
- Three things applicants should keep in mind:
 - 1. Read the Notice of Funding Availability, CIF Policy, and FAQs at portal.ct.gov/communityinvestmentfund
 - 2. Talk with CIF staff; schedule a 1:1 at portal.ct.gov/communityinvestmentfund
 - 3. Align the project with local and state priorities
- Other things new applicants should know about this funding opportunity:
 - O Minimum request is \$250,000. Minimum Capital or Small Business Program budget is \$1,500,000. Planning Grants are awarded for a set amount of \$250,000. CIF request amount is unlimited.



Tips for Success


- What are some tips for success?
 - Prioritize funding opportunities based on a strategy (NOTE: you cannot pursue everything)
 - Identify team and develop management structure to support grants
 - Evaluate potential value stacking of funding opportunities
 - Focus on community benefits and creation of quality jobs
 - Understand post-award reporting and compliance requirements

What are some common mistakes to avoid?

- o Failing to follow guidelines; ignoring eligibility requirements
- O Lacking clarity in project goals; insufficient budget details; lacking evaluation metrics; not demonstrating financial need; not allowing sufficient time or focus to write the applications; not asking for the right amount
- Submitting incomplete or poorly organized materials



PERSISTS* Decision Support Criteria can help prioritize projects

Permittable – Can get all necessary permits and/or permissions

Engaged – Considers input from and impacts to vulnerable populations

Realistic – Has community support and can be realistically achieved

Safe – Enhances or maintains the wellbeing of communities

<u>Innovative</u> – Process has considered innovative options including nature-based solutions

Scientific – Incorporates the best available science

<u>Transferable</u> – Can serve as model for other communities

<u>Sustainable</u> – Socially, economically, and ecologically sustainable


